# Air Force Junior ROTC

## 2015 – 2016 Extracurricular Activities Listing

The following extracurricular activities are associated with the Air Force Junior ROTC program. Non-cadets may participate in these programs where and as indicated below.

1. **CADET HONOR GUARD.** The AFJROTC Cadet Honor Guard presents and/or posts the Colors (US flag) at various school and community events throughout the school year. Examples include athletic events, parades, school and community ceremonies, and other events as requested. Cadets try out for Honor Guard and are selected based on their appearance in uniform, dedication to the JROTC program, and academic performance. Normally 12 – 15 cadets participate in Honor Guard each year, and are awarded a ribbon for wear on the cadet uniform at the end of the school year to recognize their accomplishments, as recommended by the cadet Drill and Ceremonies Officer. Students must be enrolled in AFJROTC to participate in Honor Guard.

2. **CADET DRILL TEAM.** The AFJROTC Cadet Drill Team practices throughout the year to sharpen their skills in both armed (using replica rifles) and unarmed drill. Drill team cadets put on drill exhibitions and enter competitions to demonstrate their skills. Normally 10 – 20 cadets participate in Drill Team each year, and are awarded a ribbon for wear on the cadet uniform at the end of the school year to recognize their accomplishments as recommended by the cadet Drill and Ceremonies Officer. Students must be enrolled in AFJROTC to participate in Drill Team.

3. **MODEL ROCKETRY.** Members of Model Rocketry launch model rockets to learn more about Aerospace Science. To successfully complete the annual program, members must pass a written safety test, and then build and successfully launch a minimum of one (1) single stage rocket and one (1) multi-stage rocket. Single stage rockets are provided by the Air Force as part of the AFJROTC curriculum. Cadets who complete the program are awarded the Model Rocketry Badge for wear on the cadet uniform upon the recommendation of the Director of Model Rocketry. Non-cadets may participate in the Model Rocketry program with the approval of the Senior Aerospace Science Instructor.

4. **AWARENESS PRESENTATION TEAM (APT)**. The Awareness Presentation Team, or APT, is designed to allow AFJROTC cadets to mentor younger, elementary school children by educating them in areas that will help them make wise choices in their lives. Sample topics include the pitfalls of smoking, drug abuse, bullying, and alcohol abuse. APT members will normally travel to Mascoutah and/or Scott Elementary Schools to make their presentations in an assembly format. Presentation options may vary, to include individualized classroom visits. Cadets who complete the program are awarded the APT Badge for wear on the cadet uniform, upon the recommendation of the Director of APT. Non-cadets may participate on the APT with the approval of the Senior Aerospace Science Instructor.

5. **KITTYHAWK AIR SOCIETY (KHAS)**. The Kittyhawk Air Society (KHAS) is the National AFJROTC Honor Society. In order to pledge for membership, cadets must meet the following criteria:

- a. Be a second semester freshman or higher in class standing.
- b. No failing grades for the current academic year in any grading period.
- c. Maintain an "A" average for each grading period in AFJROTC
- d. Maintain an overall cumulative 3.0 grade point average or higher.

Cadets who meet these criteria will be invited to pledge KHAS, and their eligibility will be re-verified each grading period. Candidate members must be invited to belong, and will normally complete a semester-long pledge program before being inducted. KHAS activities will supplement those planned by the remainder of the AFJROTC Cadet Corps, and may include tutoring, fund-raising and community service. All qualified cadets may participate each year, and are awarded a badge for wear on the cadet uniform at the end of the school year as recommended by the KHAS commander. Students must be enrolled in AFJROTC to participate in KHAS.

6. **TOASTMASTERS YOUTH LEADERSHIP PROGRAM**. The Toastmasters Youth Leadership Program (TMYL) is a sponsored function of Toastmasters International, a self-help organization to help people become better public speakers. TMYLP is oriented specifically for high school students and involves eight 2-hour sessions and a graduation ceremony/dinner. The course provides practical experience in prepared speaking (informational, persuasive, and entertaining), speech evaluation, impromptu speaking, and meeting organization. The optimal class size is 15 – 25 students, and all materials are provided free of charge to those enrolled. An orientation meeting will be held prior to actual class start. Students do not need to be enrolled in JROTC to participate.

7. **COMMUNITY SERVICE.** Air Force Junior ROTC places a great emphasis on extracurricular community service to our school and the local Mascoutah/Scott AFB community throughout the year. Cadets completing 20 or more community service hours over the academic year are awarded a ribbon for wear on the cadet uniform to recognize their accomplishments, as recommended by the cadet Director of Community Service.

## **Band**

Band is a full year course that meets 7<sup>th</sup> hour each day. First semester is primarily MARCHING BAND. The band will present a half-time performance at all home football games, and will participate in several parade and/or field competitions. The latter part of the semester is spent in preparation for the Christmas concert season. Second semester consists of symphonic wind ensemble and concert band. Students will audition for seating. Other facets of the program include Pep Band, Solo and Ensemble Contest, and several festivals.

Students must have previous knowledge of instrumental music. It is most important that students understand that Band is a part of the curriculum and is a credited graded course; however, the same requirements of an extra-curricular course apply. Much time is required outside of class (football games, parades, concerts, etc.). Participation is a large part of the requirement for the class.

**NOTE:** It is important that students registered for Band participate in the required summer session. It is at this time that the half-time presentation is learned for the upcoming marching season. It is most difficult for the student, the director and all those students in attendance to insert students after the presentation has been learned.

## **Beta Club**

The purpose of the Beta Club is to promote scholarship, leadership, and good citizenship. Members are involved in a variety of service/leadership projects throughout the school year: guides for Open House and Parent/Teacher Conferences; assisting the volunteers during the Red Cross Blood Drive; entertaining the children at the Santa Breakfast sponsored by the Tuesday Women's Club; helping local and national foundations raise money for various charities; tutoring high school and middle students; and other events. Members are awarded service hours for participating in these activities. (Members must earn 20 hours or more per year.)

In the spring, members may attend the Illinois State Beta Convention in Springfield to compete in a variety of academic, talent, and art competitions. Members placing 1<sup>st</sup> or 2<sup>nd</sup> are then invited to the National Beta Convention. The convention serves as an opportunity for the Mascoutah Betas to meet other Betas from the state and to attend a variety of general sessions and hear motivational speakers. The National Beta Organization also awards monetary scholarships ranging from \$1,000 to \$10,000.

Candidates shall be made up from the sophomore, junior and senior classes of MHS. A 2.8 cumulative grade point average is required along with three teacher recommendations. A student must possess a worthy character, a good mentality, creditable achievement and a commendable attitude. Members must earn 20 hours per year to remain active. Members earning 20 or more hours per year are awarded the Beta stole for graduation.

The cost to join the Beta Club is a one-time fee of \$25 which includes a subscription to the Beta Journal. This fee is paid upon joining the organization and covers national, state, and local dues. Local dues thereafter are \$5.00.

Meetings are held approximately once a month on Tuesday. Meetings will be held either before or after school or early evening. This will provide an opportunity for all members to attend. The annual induction banquet for new members is **required** attendance for ALL members and is held in the evening. ## **Future Business Leaders of America**

FBLA is a national high school organization which allows students who are interested in business and/or technology to become involved in school, community, and state activities relating to the business/technology field. There are more than 250,000 active members in the 50 states and U.S. territories. Members learn more about the business community by visiting businesses, inviting business people to participate in FBLA, competing in business events which provide recognition for business students, participating in community activities and charity work, and raising funds to cover costs of attending conferences, business trips, and social trips. The cost to join FBLA is \$35 per year; this fee covers the national, state, and local dues, as well as the subscription to the FBLA magazine, Today's Business Leader. Our "Kick-Off" membership drive usually begins in August. While a student need not enroll in business classes to join FBLA, it is, however, to a student's advantage to take a business or technology class, especially for competitions and awards/scholarship opportunities. Members may attend two competitions during the school year. The local competition is a one-day event held on a Saturday in January. The state competition is held on a Friday and Saturday in March or April. The members stay overnight in a hotel in Decatur for the state competition. Members placing 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, or 3<sup>rd</sup> at the state competition are then invited to the National Leadership Conference. A member must compete at the local level to be eligible for the state convention. Meetings are held approximately once a month on Wednesday in Room 211. Meetings will be held either before or after school, depending on other activities the members need to attend. ## **National Honor Society**

The Mascoutah chapter of the National Honor Society was chartered on May 9, 1958. Membership in the National Honor Society is based upon four qualities: scholarship, service, leadership and character. Students will be considered for membership during their sixth semester of high school in which they have spent at least one semester (i.e. MCHS) and be of junior or senior status. In addition, students must have earned a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.5 on a 4.0 unweighted scale in coursework considered to be within the college preparatory curriculum. This cumulative grade point average must be earned in four out of five academic college preparatory subject areas. Coursework must include academic preparation in the "core" subject areas, including College Preparatory English, Math, Science, Social Studies, and Foreign Language or fine arts. Refer to the Curriculum Guide for specific course titles. Participation in campus and community organizations will be considered, along with the demonstration of leadership talents. If inducted into the National Honor Society, a student will be expected to continue his academic performance with a minimum cumulative GPA at the 3.5 level in the college preparatory curriculum.

Membership in the National Honor Society is recognized on the official transcript. Members are also recognized at graduation by their gold cords. Each spring, new inductees are recognized at the induction luncheon. Transfer students who have previously been inducted into the National Honor Society will be welcomed into the Mascoutah Chapter upon presentation of credential from the previous institution.

## **Purple Crush Spirit Club**

Are you bursting with school spirit? If so, Purple Crush is the group for you. This organization plans Homecoming Week and the Athletic Pep Assemblies. We also work to raise the level of Indian Pride within our school and community through good sportsmanship and enthusiasm for all of our Indian teams. ## **TRANSITION COACHES**

During the first couple of weeks of school, Coaches will facilitate advisory groups to be a resource person, a familiar face at lunch or in classes, and provide information about school and community activities. When new students register after school starts, coaches will serve as lunch hosts, including new students in their lunch circle of friends. Coaches need to be accepting of others, willing to share information, good listeners, and happy to be at MHS. Positive attitudes are a must. ## **Winterguard/Colorguard**

In the fall, the colorguard is part of the marching band. When the marching band activity ends in November, the colorguard continues indoors as the Winterguard. They move inside to a gym floor for a fun-filled season of high-powered competition using recorded music. Tryouts begin in November, and then they start rehearsals for their competitive winter program. Competitions begin in late January and continue through March. The guard competes at the Mid-Continent Color Guard Circuit as well as Winterguard International (W.G.I.).

Requirements are high school students with a desire to learn the necessary skills to succeed in a competitive activity. Everyone is expected to be faithful to the rehearsal schedule and attend all competitions. Two major fundraisers are scheduled during the season to defray the costs of equipment (rifles, flags, sabers, props, uniforms, etc.). There are no fees, but each member is required to participate in the fundraisers. In the summer, all members who wish to return are strongly encouraged to attend a colorguard camp. Winterguard is open to males and females, grades 9-12.
